



ADHD is the most common neurobehavioral health disorder in children. It affects up to 10% of school-aged children.

ADHD commonly occurs with other disorders including learning/communication, oppositional defiance, anxiety, conduct, and mood disorders.

ADHD medications along with school accommodations and psychological therapy are the most successful interventions for ADHD

Medication have been approved for ADHD treatment by the FDA, including Stimulants and Non-stimulants.







Children and teens on these medications need close monitoring. This may be monthly to every 4 months for an in office visit.

Children MUST be up to date on their appointments to get a medication refill - always schedule your child's next appointment before leaving the office to ensure you are up to date.

Stimulant-Related Side Effects:

- Loss of Appetite (Anorexia)
- Weight Loss
- Difficulty Sleeping (Insomnia)
- Dizziness
- Irritability or Moodiness
- Growth Problems
- Heart Symptoms
